About this user manual

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Important notice

Please check to see if any problems you have encountered with your phone are described in this section before taking the phone in for service or calling a service representative.

1. Phone memory

When available space on your phone memory is less than 2%, your phone cannot receive new messages. You will need to check your phone memory and delete some data, such as applications or messages to make more memory available.

To manage applications:

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab  > **Settings** > **Applications** > **Manage applications**.
2. Touch a tab at the top of the screen and select the application you want to uninstall.
3. Tap **Uninstall** > **OK** to uninstall the application.

2. Optimizing battery life

You can extend your battery's life between charges by turning off features that you don't need constantly running in the background. You can also monitor how applications and system resources consume battery power.

To extend the life of your battery:

- Turn off radio communications that you aren't using. If you aren't using Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, or GPS, turn them off.
- Turn down screen brightness and set a shorter screen timeout.
- Turn off automatic syncing for Gmail, Calendar, Contacts, and other applications.
- Some applications you have downloaded may cause your battery's life to be reduced.

To check the battery charge level:

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  > **Settings** > **About phone** > **Status**.
2. The battery status (charging or discharging) and level (as a percentage of fully charged) are displayed at the top of the screen.

To monitor and control what uses the battery:

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  > **Settings** > **About phone** > **Battery use**.
2. This screen displays battery usage times. It lists all of the applications or services using battery power from the greatest amount of energy used to the least amount.

3. Installing an open source Operating System

Installing an open source Operating System on your phone and not using the Operating System provided by the manufacturer may cause your phone to malfunction.

 **WARNING:** If you install and use an Operating System other than the one provided by the manufacturer, your phone is no longer covered by the warranty.

 **WARNING:** To protect your phone and personal data, only download applications from trusted sources, such as Android Market. If some applications are not properly installed on your phone, your phone may not work properly or a serious error may occurred. You will need to uninstall these applications and all of their data and settings from the phone.

4. Using an unlock pattern

Set an unlock pattern to secure your phone.

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  > **Settings** > **Location & security** > **Set up screen lock** > **Pattern**.

2. A set of screens guide you through drawing a screen unlock pattern. Tap **Next** (twice).
3. Draw your pattern and tap **Continue**. Then redraw your pattern and tap **Confirm**.

Caution: You need to create your Google account first before you set an unlock pattern.

! WARNING: Precautions to take when using the unlock pattern

It is very important that you remember the unlock pattern you set. You will not be able to access your phone if you use an incorrect pattern five times. You have five chances to enter your unlock Pattern, PIN or Password. If you have used all five chances, you can try again after 30 seconds.

If you can't recall your unlock Pattern:

If you have tried to log on to your Google account on the phone and failed to use correct pattern five times, tap **Forgot pattern?** You will then be required to sign in with your Google account to unlock your phone.

If you haven't created a Google account on the phone or you forgot it, you need to perform a factory reset.

5. Using hard reset

If your phone does not restore to the original condition, use a Hard Reset (Factory Reset) to initialize it.

When the phone is turned off, press and hold the **A Key**  + **F Key**  + **Down Volume Key**  + **Power/Lock Key**  at the same time (for over ten seconds). The phone will turn on and perform a factory reset immediately.

! WARNING: If you perform a Hard Reset, all user applications, user data and DRM licenses will be deleted. Please remember to back up any important data before performing a Hard Reset.

6. Connecting to Wi-Fi networks

To use Wi-Fi on your phone, you need to access a wireless access point or "hotspot." Some access points are open and you can simply connect to them. Others are hidden or implement other security features, so you must configure your phone to connect to them.

Turn off Wi-Fi when you're not using it to extend the life of your battery.

To turn Wi-Fi on and connect to a Wi-Fi network:

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  > **Settings** > **Wireless & networks** > **Wi-Fi settings**.
2. Tap **Wi-Fi** to turn it on and begin scanning for available Wi-Fi networks.
 - A list of available Wi-Fi networks is displayed. Secured networks are indicated by a lock icon.
3. Tap a network to connect to it.
 - If the network is open, you are prompted to confirm that you want to connect to that network by tapping **Connect**.
 - If the network is secured, you are prompted to enter a password or other credentials. Ask your network administrator for details.
4. The Status Bar displays icons that indicate Wi-Fi status.

7. Opening and switching applications

Multi-tasking is easy with Android because open applications keep running even when you open another application. There's no need to quit an application before opening another. Use and switch among several open applications. Android manages each application, stopping and starting them as needed, to ensure that idle applications don't consume resources unnecessarily.

To stop the application you are using:

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab  > **Settings** > **Applications** > **Manage applications**.
2. Tap a tab at the top of the screen and select the desired application.
3. Tap **Force stop** to stop using it.

TIP!

Getting back to a recent application

Touch and hold the **Home Key** . A screen will appear listing the applications you have recently used.

8. Connecting your phone to a computer via USB

Transfer file on your microSD card using USB devices:

1. Install your microSD card on your phone if it is not already installed.
2. Before connecting the USB cable, make sure that **Mass storage only** mode is enabled on your phone. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab  > **Settings** > **Storage**, then select the **Mass storage only** check box.
3. Use the USB cable with your phone to connect the phone to a USB port on your computer. You will receive a notification that the USB is connected.

4. Tap **Turn on USB storage**. Then tap **OK** to confirm.

When the phone is connected as USB storage, you will receive a notification. Your phone's microSD card is mounted as a drive on your computer. You can now copy files to and from the microSD card.

NOTE: The USB and Bluetooth drivers are not automatically removed. Therefore, they must be uninstalled manually.

When the USB is connected, you can't access the microSD card from your phone, so you can't use applications that rely on the microSD card, such as Camera, Gallery and Music.

To disconnect your phone from the computer, carefully follow your computer's instructions for correctly disconnecting USB devices to avoid losing information on the card.

1. Safely disconnect the USB device on your computer.
2. Open the **Notifications Panel** and tap **Turn off USB storage**.
3. Tap **Turn off USB storage** on the screen that opens.

9. Unlock screen when using data connection

Your screen will go dark if untouched for a period of time when using a data connection. To turn on your LCD screen, just touch it.

10. Do not connect your phone when you power on/off your PC

Make sure you disconnect your phone from the PC as it might cause errors on your PC.

11. Hold your phone upright

Please hold your phone straight and upright, as with a normal phone. Your phone has an internal antenna. Be careful not to scratch or damage the back of the phone, as this will cause a loss of performance. While making/receiving calls or sending/receiving data, try to avoid holding the lower part of the phone where the antenna is located. This may affect call quality.

12. If the screen freezes

If the phone does not respond to user input or the screen freezes:

Remove the battery, insert it again and turn on the phone. If it still does not work, please contact customer service.

Getting to know your phone

To turn on the phone, press and hold the **Power/Lock Key**  for three seconds.

To turn off the phone, press the **Power/Lock Key**  for three seconds and tap **Power off**. Then tap **OK** to confirm.



Dual touch screens

Your phone has two touch screens - the main Home screen and the second screen.

Home screen



Second screen

Dual touch screens allow you to multitask. For example, you can read email on the Home screen and type a text message on the second screen.

NOTE: Proximity Sensor

When receiving and making calls, the proximity sensor automatically turns the backlight off and locks the touch keypad by sensing when the phone is near your ear. This extends battery life and prevents the touch keypad from activating unintentionally during calls.

! WARNING:

Placing a heavy object on the phone or sitting on it can damage its LCD and touch screen functions. Do not cover the LCD's proximity sensor with protective film. This may cause the sensor to malfunction.

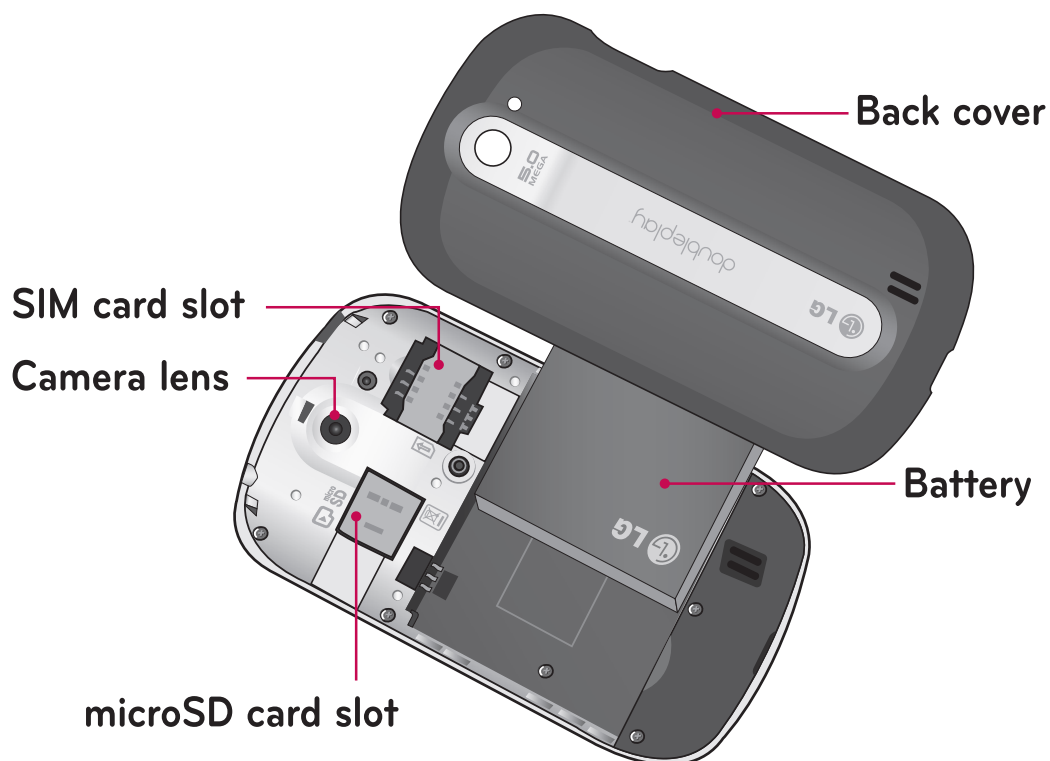
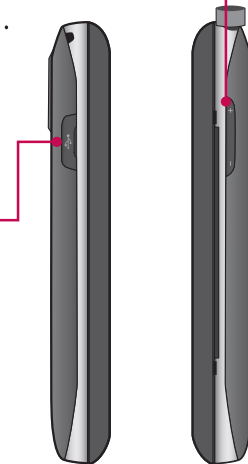

Installing the SIM card and battery

The SIM (Subscriber Identity Module) card identifies your phone to the wireless network. You cannot make or receive calls or browse the Internet without the SIM card.

Before you can start exploring your new phone, you'll need to set it up. To insert the SIM card and battery:

1. Detach the SIM card from its packaging.



2. Use the notch at the bottom of your phone to lift the back cover up and remove it.



3. Use the fingertip cutout at the bottom of the battery compartment to remove the battery, then insert the SIM card as shown.



4. Align the gold contacts on the battery with the gold contacts in the battery compartment.



5. Press the battery into place and replace the back cover.

BATTERY

Before using your phone for the first time, fully charge the battery and let it drain completely, then re-charge to full battery level and use normally.

Charge the battery

1. Insert the small end of the USB cable into the Charger/USB Port, as shown.
2. Plug the other end into an electrical wall outlet or remove the adapter and plug it into a USB port on a computer.



Tip: To extend battery life, turn off Bluetooth®, GPS, and Wi-Fi when not in use. For more tips on extending battery life, see the **Battery Management** section of this guide.

! Notice

Use only an LG-approved battery, charger (1A) and USB cable (1A) specific to your phone model since they are designed to maximize battery life. Using other chargers and USB cables will not guarantee full battery charge and normal charging time.

Memory Card

Your phone comes with a microSD card.

Install the memory card

1. Use the notch on the bottom of your phone to lift the back cover up and remove it.
2. Gently push the memory card into the slot until it clicks into place. Replace the back cover.

Remove the memory card

1. Remove the back cover and gently push the microSD card into the slot until you hear a click. This releases the microSD card from the slot.
2. Gently pull the card from the slot to remove it.



! WARNING

Do not insert or remove the memory card when the phone is on. Otherwise, you may damage the memory card as well as your phone and the data stored on the memory card may be corrupted.

Formatting the memory card

Your memory card may already be formatted. If it isn't, you must format it before you can use it.

NOTE: All files on your memory card are deleted when you format it.

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab** .
2. Tap **Settings > Storage**.
3. Tap **Unmount SD card** and **OK** to confirm.

4. Tap **Erase SD card**, then confirm your choice.
5. If you set the pattern lock, input the pattern lock and select **Erase everything**. The card will then be formatted and ready to use.

NOTE: If there is content on your memory card, the folder structure may be different after formatting, as all the files will have been deleted. When the phone is connected as USB storage, some menu items cannot be used at the same time, or may be grayed out.

TIP!

If your memory card is already unmounted, you can use the following steps to erase its contents.

Tap the **Applications tab**  > **Settings** > **Storage** > **Erase SD card**.

! WARNING: Do not insert or remove the memory card when the phone is on. Otherwise, you may damage the memory card as well as your phone and the data stored on the memory card may be corrupted. To remove the memory card safely, please tap the **Applications tab**  > **Settings** > **Storage** > **Unmount SD card**.

Power

To turn the power on

Press and hold the **Power/Lock Key**  .

To turn the power off

Press and hold the **Power/Lock Key**  , tap **Power off**, then tap **OK**.

Your Home screen

Touch-screen tips

Here are some tips on how to navigate around your phone.



Touch or tap

To select an item or open an application.

or

Touch and hold

To drag an item or to add widgets, shortcuts, and applications to your Home screen.

NOTE:

- To select an item, touch the center of the icon.
- Do not to press too hard; the touch screen is sensitive enough to pick up a light, firm touch.
- Use the tip of your finger to touch the option you want. Be careful not to touch any other keys.

Lock your phone

When you are not using your phone, press the **Power/Lock Key**  to lock your phone. This helps to prevent accidental touching of the keys and saves battery power.

If you do not use the phone for a while, the screen you are viewing is replaced by the lock screen to conserve the battery.

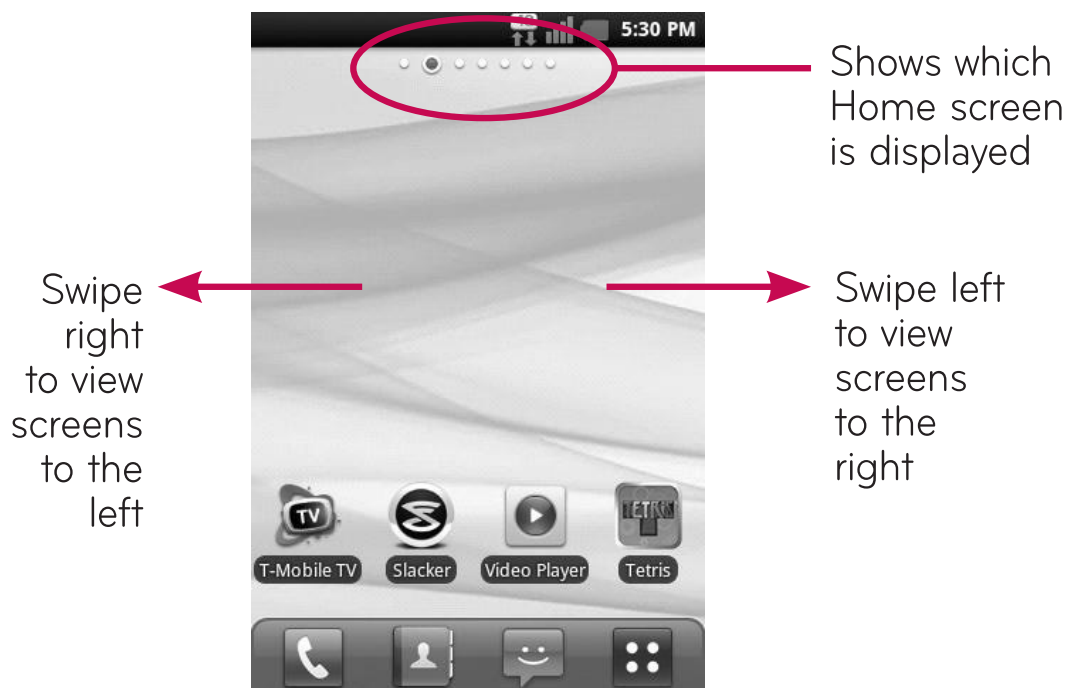
NOTE: If there are any programs running when you set the pattern, they may be still running in lock mode. It is recommended that you exit all programs before entering lock mode to avoid unnecessary charges (e.g., phone call, web access and data communications).

Unlock the screen

To wake up your phone, press the **Power/Lock Key** . The lock screen will appear. Touch the bottom tab and slide it upwards to unlock your screen. The last screen you were working on will open.

Home Screen

Swipe your finger left or right to view more of your Home screen. You can customize each screen with widgets or shortcuts to your favorite applications.



-  Tap to open the Dialer screen.
-  Tap to open your Contacts list.
-  Tap to send text messages.
-  Tap to access other applications.

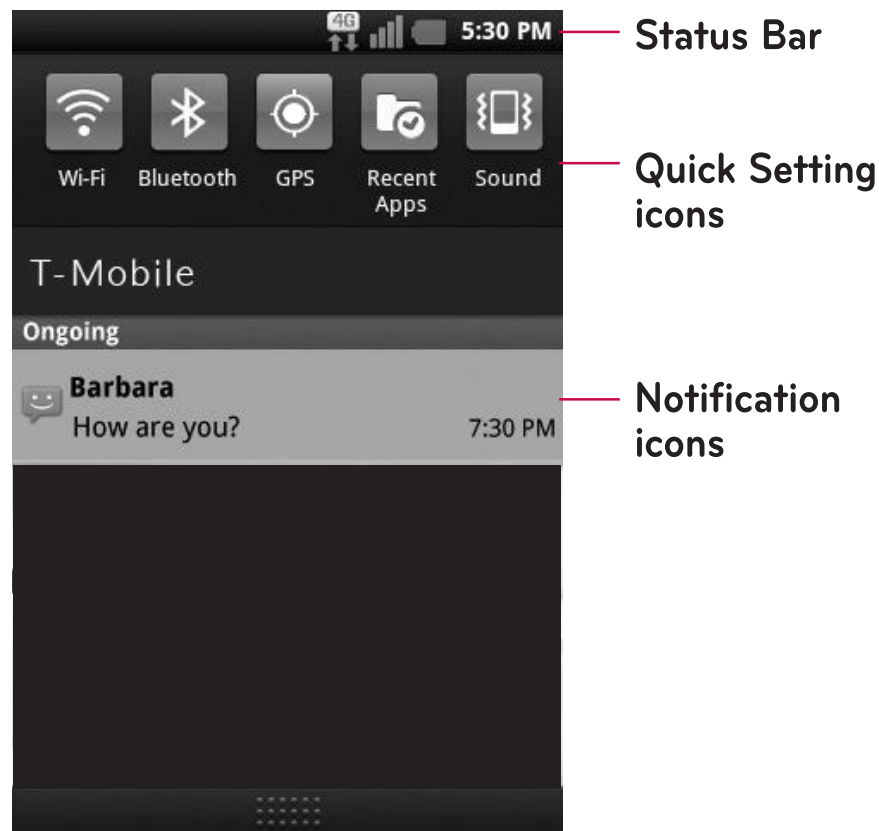
Status Bar

The Status Bar appears at the top of every Home screen. Icons indicating the phone's status and new notification alerts appear on the Status Bar.

Applications screen

To access the Application screens, from any Home screen, tap the **Applications tab** . Swipe up or down to scroll through the screen. As you download new applications, they will appear under **Downloads** in alphabetical order.

Manage applications

1. Collapse application categories by tapping the heading bar or by pinching on your screen using your fingers.
2. Tap **Manage app**.
3. Touch and hold the application you want to move to a different category.
4. When your phone vibrates, drag the application to the desired category and then release.

Add a new category

1. Collapse application categories by tapping the heading bar or by pinching on your screen using your fingers.
2. Tap **Manage category**.
3. Tap **Add**.
4. Enter the category name.
5. Tap **Save**.

Unlock the screen

1. Quickly press the **Power/Lock Key**  to wake the display.
2. Touch and drag the bottom of the screen up.

Add items to the Home screen

1. Swipe left or right to the desired Home screen.
2. Touch and hold an empty spot on the Home screen.
3. Tap **Widgets**, **Shortcuts**, or **Folders** and then tap the desired item.

Moving or deleting items on the Home screen

1. Touch and hold the item you want to move or delete until it vibrates.
2. Drag it to another location or to the **Trash Can** icon  at the bottom of the screen.

Change Home screen wallpaper

1. Touch and hold an empty spot on any Home screen.
2. Tap **Wallpapers**.
3. Tap **Gallery**, **Live Wallpaper**, or **Downloaded Wallpaper**. You can also tap one of the available wallpapers not in the folders to immediately set it as your background.
4. Tap the desired image.
5. Tap **Set wallpaper** or **Save**.

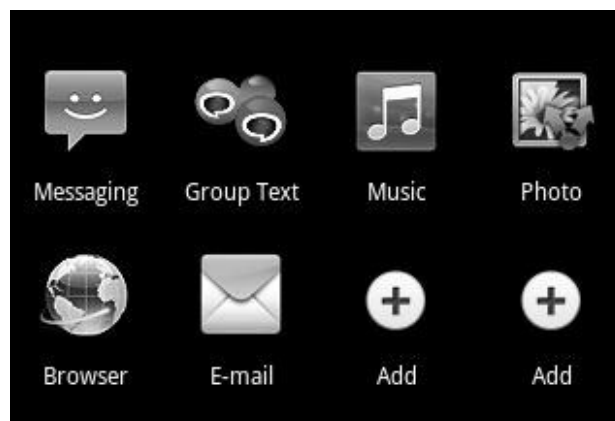
Second screen



Manage applications from the dual touch screen

Dual touch screens allow you to multitask. For example, you can read email on the Home screen and type and send a text message on the second screen.

The second screen contains shortcut icons that you can customize.



Add a shortcut to the second screen

Tap **Add** and tap the shortcut you want to add.

Remove a shortcut to the second screen

1. Touch and hold the shortcut you want to remove.
2. Tap the red **Delete** icon .

Moving the shortcut application from the second screen to Home screen

1. On the second screen, tap the shortcut of the application you want to use on Home screen.
2. Tap the **Move tab**  and the shortcut application will be displayed on Home screen.

Return to the shortcut application to the second screen

Tap the **Home tab**  to return the application to the second screen.



NOTE: The applications supported on the second screen can be used on both the main screen and the second screen simultaneously. However, the two screens cannot be used simultaneously when using the Group Text, Music and Rich Note applications. If you run one of the applications above on the second screen while the same application is running on the main screen, the application on the main screen will be displayed on the second screen and the most recently executed screen will be displayed on the main screen.

Ringtones & Volume

Adjust in-call volume

While on a call, press the **Up** or **Down Volume Keys**  .

Set incoming call and notification ringtones

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Sound**.
4. Tap **Phone ringtone** or **Notification ringtone**.
5. Tap the ringtone you want to use. It will briefly be played.
6. Tap **OK**.

Adjust the volume for ringtone, media, alarm, and notification

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Sound**.
4. Tap **Volume**.
5. Touch and drag the sliders to the desired volume levels.
6. Tap **OK**.

Silence the dial pad touch tones

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Sound**.
4. Tap **Audible touch tones** and **Audible selection** check boxes to disable the functions. Make sure that there is not checkmark in the box to ensure that the function is disabled.

Typing

QWERTY keyboard



Shift Key: Press to enter capital letters. To lock the **Shift Key**, press it twice. To unlock it, press it again.

Space Key: Press to enter spaces when in a text entry field.

Alt Key: Press to enter alternate characters such as the number 2 (using the W key). To lock the **Alt Key**, press it twice. To unlock the key, press it again.

Delete Key: Press to delete the previous character.

Enter Key: Press to move to the next line or to enter text and move to the next screen.

On-screen keyboard

You can enter text using the on-screen keyboard. The on-screen keyboard displays automatically on the screen when you need to enter text. To manually display the keyboard, simply touch a text field where you want to enter text.

Text Input Methods

- **Swype** (Default): Swype™ is a text input method that allows you to enter a word by sliding your finger from letter to letter, lifting your finger between words.
- **Android keyboard**: The Android keyboard can also be used to enter text. To switch to the Android keyboard, touch and hold a text field, then tap **Input method > Android keyboard**.

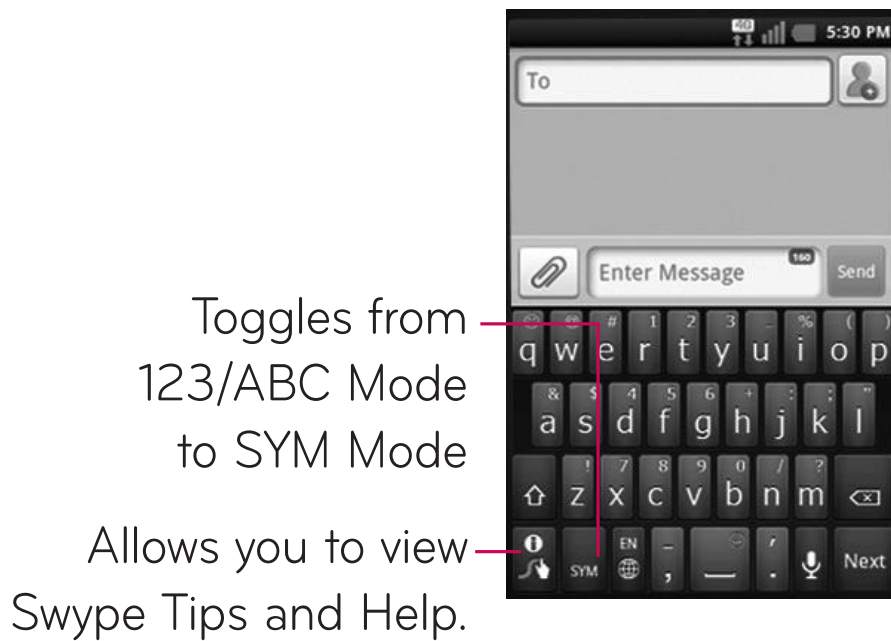
Using the Swype Keyboard

The Swype™ keyboard uses error correcting algorithms and also includes a predictive text system.



You can tap the on-screen keyboard to enter text or you can slide your finger across the screen in a continuous finger motion with Swype®.

To Swype the word cat, touch the letter **c** and slide your finger through all the letters of the word. When you reach the letter **t**, release your finger. To learn more about entering text with Swype, tap the **Swype Help Key** .



Swype Text Entry Tips

You can access Swype Tips and watch a tutorial on using Swype. You can also use the following Swype text entry tips.

- Create a squiggle (like an S shape) to create a double letter (such as pp in apple).
- Touch and hold a key to enter the alternate letter or symbol located at the top right corner of the key.
- Move your finger over the apostrophe to enter contractions.
- Double-touch on the word you want to change or correct a misspelled word.
- Tap the **Delete Key**  to erase one character. Touch and hold the **Delete Key**  to erase an entire word.

Swype Settings

To configure Swype settings:

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Menu Key**  **> Settings > Language & keyboard > Swype.**
2. The following Swype settings are available:

< Preferences settings >

- **Language:** Allows you to select what languages can be used in Swype.
- **Audio feedback:** Turns sounds generated by the Swype application on and off.
- **Vibrate on keypress:** Activates a vibration sensation as you enter text using the keypad.
- **Show tips:** Turns on an on-screen flashing indicator that provides helpful user information.

< Swype Advanced Settings >

- **Word suggestion:** Uses a built-in word database to predict words while entering text in Swype.
- **Auto-spacing:** Automatically inserts a space between words. When you finish a word, just lift your finger and start the next word.
- **Auto-capitalization:** Automatically capitalizes the first letter of a sentence.

- **Show complete trace:** Sets the length of time the word trace line remains on-screen as you swipe across the screen.
- **Speed vs. accuracy:** Sets how quickly Swype responds to on-screen input. Move the slider between **Fast Response** (speed) or **Error Tolerance** (accuracy) and touch **OK**.
- **Personal dictionary:** Manage your personal dictionary.
- **Reset Swype's dictionary:** Delete all the words you've added to Swype's dictionary.

This menu provides help and a tutorial to guide you through the process.

- **Swype help:** Displays the Swype User Manual.
- **Tutorial:** Provides an on-screen tutorial.

< About >

The About section provides the current software version for the Swype application.

Google Account Set-up

The first time you open a Google application on your phone, you will be required to sign in with your existing Google account. If you do not have a Google account, you will be prompted to create one.

Creating your Google account

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab** .
2. Tap **Gmail** and then tap **Next > Create** to start the Gmail set up wizard.
3. Touch a text field to open the keyboard and enter your name and username for your Google account.
4. When you have finished inputting your name and username, tap **Next**. Your phone then communicates with Google servers and checks for username availability.
5. Enter and re-enter your password. Then follow the instructions and enter the required and optional information about the account. Wait while the server creates your account.

Signing in to your Google account

1. On the Home screen, touch the **Applications** tab  > **Gmail** > **Next** > **Sign in**.
2. Enter your e-mail address and password, then tap **Sign in**.
3. After signing in, you can use Gmail and take advantages of Google services on your phone.
4. Once you have set up your Google account on your phone, it will be automatically synchronized with your Google account on the web (depending on your synchronization settings).

After signing in, you can use Gmail, Google Calendar, and Android Market; back up your settings to Google servers; and take advantage of other Google services on your phone.

IMPORTANT!

- Some applications, such as Calendar, only work with the first Google account you add. If you plan to use more than one Google account with your phone, be sure to sign into the one you want to use with these applications first. When you sign in, your Contacts, Gmail messages, Calendar events and other information from these

applications and services on the web are synchronized with your phone. If you don't sign into a Google account during setup, you will be prompted to sign in or to create a Google account the first time you start an application that requires one, such as Gmail or Android Market.

- If you want to use the backup feature to restore your settings to this phone from another phone that was running Android OS 2.3 Gingerbread or later, you must sign into your Google account now, during setup. If you wait until after setup is complete, your settings will not be restored.
- If you have an enterprise account through your company or other organization, your IT department may have special instructions on how to sign into that account.

Calls

Making a voice call

1. Tap the **Phone Key**  to open the keypad.
2. Enter the number on the keypad. To delete a digit, tap the **Delete Key** .
3. Tap the **Call Key**  to make a call.
4. To end a call, tap the **End Key** .

TIP! To enter "+" to make international calls, touch and hold down .

TIP! To bring up the keypad during a call, tap **Dialpad**.

Answer and end calls

To answer a call when your phone is in sleep mode, touch the bottom part of the screen and drag it upwards. If the screen is unlocked, tap **Accept**. To end the call, tap **End**.

Use mute and speakerphone

While on a call, tap **Mute** or **Speaker Keys** to turn either feature on or off.

Calling your contacts

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Phone Key**  and choose the **Contacts** tab.

2. Scroll through the contact list or tap the **Search Key**  and enter the first letter(s) of the contact.
3. In the list, tap the contact you want to call and then tap the phone number.

Adjusting call volume

To adjust the in-call volume, use the Up/Down **Volume Keys**   on the right side of the phone.

Making a second call

1. During your initial call, tap **Dialpad**  or **Contacts** .
2. Dial the number or search your contacts to select the number you want to call.
3. Tap the **Call Key**  to connect the call.
4. Both calls will be displayed on the call screen. Your initial call will be put on hold.
5. To toggle between calls, tap the Call entry on the screen.
NOTE: You can tap **Merge calls**  to make a conference call.
6. To end active calls, tap the **End Key** .

Viewing your call logs

On the Home screen, tap the **Phone Key**  and choose the **Call log** tab.

View a complete list of all dialed, received and missed calls.

TIP! Tap any single call log entry to view the date, time, and duration of the call.

TIP! Tap the **Menu Key** , then tap **Clear All** to delete all of the recorded items.

Call settings

You can configure phone call settings, such as call forwarding and other special features offered by your carrier.

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  to open the applications menu.
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Call settings** and choose the options that you want to adjust.

< Fixed Dialing Numbers >

Select **Fixed Dialing Numbers** to enable the function and compile a list of numbers that can be called from your phone. You'll need your PIN2 code, which is available from your service provider. Only numbers within the fixed dial list can be called from your phone.

< Voicemail >

Voicemail service – Allows you to select your voicemail service.

Voicemail settings – Allows you to change your voicemail number, if available.

< Other call settings >

TTY mode – Allows you to activate TTY mode to communicate with a TTY device.

Hearing aids – Allows you to turn on hearing aid compatibility.

Voice clarity – Select this option to make voice sound clearer under noisy environments.

Call reject – Allows you to enable and disable the Call reject function and manage your Call reject list.

Decline call with a message – Allows you to add and edit the decline messages.

Call forwarding – You can configure how your calls are forwarded when you are on the phone, when you don't answer, and so on.

Call duration – View the duration of all calls including all calls, dialed calls, received calls, and the last call.

Additional settings – This lets you change the following settings:

- **Caller ID:** Choose whether to display your number on an outgoing call.
- **Call waiting:** If call waiting is activated, the handset will notify you of an incoming call while you are on Call (depending on your network provider).

Voicemail

Use voicemail

To call and set up voicemail:

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Phone Key** .
2. Touch and hold  to call voicemail.
3. Listen to and follow the instructions to set up your voicemail account.

To reset the voicemail password to the last four digits of your phone number:

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Phone Key** .
2. Tap **#793#**.
3. Tap the **Call Key** .
4. Tap **OK**.

Use Visual Voicemail

Visual Voicemail allows you to view a list of your voicemail messages and play them in any order.

To set up Visual Voicemail:

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Applications tab** .
2. Scroll to and tap **Visual Voicemail**.
3. Tap **Next**.
4. Tap the blue **Record** icon  to record your greeting.

5. Tap the red **Stop** icon  when done.
6. Tap **Next**.
7. Enter a name for your recording.
8. Tap **Next**.
9. Tap **Done**.

To check Visual Voicemail:

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Scroll to and tap **Visual Voicemail**.
3. Tap the voicemail message you want to play.
4. Tap the **Play** icon .

To delete Visual Voicemail messages:

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Scroll to and tap **Visual Voicemail**.
3. Tap the voicemail message you want to delete.
4. Tap the **Delete** icon .
5. Tap **OK**.

Contacts

You can add contacts on your phone and synchronize them with the contacts in your Google account or other accounts that support syncing contacts.

Searching for a contact

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  **Contacts** or tap the **Phone Key**  and choose the **Contacts** tab.
2. Tap the **Search Key**  or the **Search field** at the top of the screen and enter the contact name using the keypad.

Adding a new contact

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Phone Key**  and enter the new contact's number. Then tap the **Menu Key**  > **Add to Contacts** > **Create new Contact**.
2. If you want to add a picture to the new contact, tap . Choose from **Capture picture**, **Pick from Gallery**, or **Pick from videos**.
3. Tap the name fields to open the touch keyboard and enter the contact's name.
4. Tap a category of contact information and enter the details about your contact.
5. Tap **Save** to save the contact.

Favorite contacts

You can classify frequently called contacts as favorites for easier access.

To add a contact to your favorites:

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Phone Key**  and choose the **Contacts** tab.
2. Tap a contact to view their details.
3. Tap the star to the right of the contact's name. The star turns gold, indicating that the contact has been added to your favorites.

To remove a contact from your favorites list:

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Phone Key** .
2. Tap the **Groups** tab and choose **Favorites**.
3. Tap a contact and then tap the gold star to the right of the contact's name. The star turns grey and the contact is removed from your favorites.

Import and export contacts

You can move contacts between your SIM card and your phone.

1. From any Home screen, tap **Contacts** .
2. Tap the **Menu Key** .
3. Tap **More**.
4. Tap **Import/Export**.

5. Tap **Import from SIM card** or **Export to SIM**.
6. If necessary, tap the account you want to use.
7. Tap to select the check boxes next to the contact(s) you want to move.
8. Tap **Import** or **Export**.
9. Tap **OK** to confirm.

Messaging

Messaging

Your doubleplay combines SMS and MMS into one intuitive, easy-to-use menu.

Access text messaging

From any Home screen, tap **Messaging** .

Sending a message

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  > **Messaging** > **New Message** to open a blank message.
2. Enter a contact name or number in the **To** field. As you enter the contact name or number, matching contacts appear. You can also tap a suggested recipient and add multiple contacts.
NOTE: You will be charged for a text or multimedia message for every person you send the message to.
3. Tap the message field to start entering your message.
4. Tap **Send** to send your message.
The message screen opens, with your message after your name. Responses appear on the screen. As you view and send additional messages, a message thread is created.

! WARNING: The 160-character limit may vary from country to country depending on how the SMS is coded and the language.

! WARNING: If an image, video or audio file is added to an SMS message, it will be automatically converted into an MMS message and you will be charged accordingly.

NOTE: If you get an SMS message during a call there will be ring notification.

Read text messages

From the Notifications Panel:

1. Tap the Status Bar and drag it downwards to open the Notifications Panel.
2. Tap the New Message notification to read the message(s).

From the Messages screen:

1. From any Home screen, tap **Messaging** .
2. Tap the thread containing the message you want to read.

Delete text messages

1. From any Home screen, tap **Messaging** .
2. Tap the thread containing the message you want to delete.
3. Touch and hold the message you want to delete.
4. Tap **Delete message**.
5. Tap **OK**.

Group Text

Use the Group Text application to hold conversations with groups of contacts. Group members can read and respond to the messages in a Group Text conversation.

Create a new group

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Tap **Group Text**.
3. Read the Terms of Service and tap **Accept**.
4. Enter your first and last name and tap **OK**.
5. To select a profile image, tap **OK**. Otherwise tap **Skip**.
6. **Create New Group**.

7. Tap **Add** to add a new contact or enter the name of a saved contact.
8. Tap **Save**.
9. If desired, enter a name for your new group.
10. Tap **OK**.

Send a group text

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Tap **Group Text**.
3. Tap the group you want to text.
4. Tap the text entry field and enter your message.
5. Tap **Send**.

Changing your message settings

Your phone's message settings are predefined so you can send messages immediately. You can change the settings based on your preferences.

From the Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab  > **Messaging** > **Menu Key**  > **Settings**.

E-mail

Set up Gmail™

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Tap **Gmail**.
Note: If you have already set up at least one other Gmail account, tap the **Menu Key**  > **Accounts** > **Add account**.
3. Tap **Next**.
4. Tap **Create** or **Sign in**.
5. Follow the on-screen instructions.

Set up personal email

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Tap **Email**.
Note: If you have already set up at least one other email account, tap the **Menu Key**  > **More** > **Accounts** > **Menu Key**  > **Add account**.
3. Tap **Yahoo!, Windows Live, Hotmail, AOL, (or other)**.
4. Enter your email address and password.
5. Tap **Next**.
6. If desired, enter a unique name for your email account.

7. Enter the name you want displayed on outgoing messages.

8. Tap **Done**.

Set up corporate email

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .

2. Tap **Email**.

Note: If you have already set up at least one other email account, tap the **Menu Key**  > **More** > **Accounts** > **Menu Key**  > **Add account**.

3. Tap **MS Exchange**.

4. Enter your email address and password.

5. Tap **Next**.

6. Enter the Exchange Server address and Domain name.

7. If necessary, tap to select or clear the **Use SSL** check box.

8. Tap **Next**.

9. Tap **Activate**.

10. If required, set a password. The password must include at least one letter, one number, and one symbol.

11. If desired, enter a unique name for your email account.
12. Enter the name you want displayed on outgoing messages.
13. Tap **Done**.

Opening your email and email accounts screen

You can use the **Email** application to read email from services other than Gmail. The **Email** application supports the following account types: POP3, IMAP and Exchange.

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  > **Email**.
2. The first time you open the **Email** application, a setup wizard opens to help you add an email account.
3. After initial setup, **Email** displays the contents of your **Inbox**.

TIP!

- If you press and hold an account from the list of email accounts, you can select the desired option in the Context menu. For example, select **Remove account** to remove the account from your phone.

The Accounts screen

The **Accounts screen** lists your **Combined Inbox** and each of your email accounts.

1. Open the **Email** application. If you're not on the email account screen, touch the **Menu Key**  > **More** > **Accounts**.
2. The **Combined Inbox** is displayed. The account from which you send email by default is indicated with a checkmark.

To open your Combined Inbox:

If you have configured email to send and receive email from more than one account, you can view all messages sent to all accounts in your **Combined Inbox** and all of your accounts will be displayed.

1. Open the **Email** application.
2. Touch **Combined Inbox** (in the **Accounts** screen). Messages in the **Combined Inbox** are color coded along their left sides, by account, using the same colors that are used for your accounts in the **Accounts** screen.

Only your account's most recent emails are downloaded to your phone. To download more (earlier) email messages, touch **Load more messages** at the bottom of the emails list.

Composing and sending email

To compose and send a message:

1. While in the **Email** application, tap the **Menu Key**  and tap **Compose**.
2. Enter an address for the message's intended recipient. As you enter text, matching addresses are offered from your contacts. Separate multiple addresses with commas.
3. Tap the **Menu Key**  and touch **Add Cc/Bcc** to be able to copy other contacts/email addresses.
4. Enter the text of the message.
5. Tap **Attach** to attach the file you want to share with your message.
6. Tap **Send** to send the email.

If you're not ready to send the message, tap the **Menu Key**  > **Save as draft** to save it in a Drafts folder. Tap a draft message in a Drafts folder to resume working on it. Your message will also be saved as a draft if you tap the **Back Key**  before sending it. If you aren't connected to a network, for example, if you're composing in Airplane mode, you cannot send an message until you're connected to a network again. Also, the messages that you send are stored in your Outbox folder. If it contains any pending messages, the Outbox is displayed on the Accounts screen.

Please note that messages sent using an Exchange account will not be located on the phone; they will, however, be located on the Exchange server itself.

If you want to see your sent messages in the **Sent** folder you will often need to open the Sent folder and select **Refresh** from the options menu.

Working with account folders

Each account has **Inbox**, **Outbox**, **Sent**, **Drafts**, and **Trash** folders. Depending on the features supported by your account's service provider, you may have additional folders.

Adding and editing email accounts

To add an email account:

1. From the Accounts screen, tap the **Menu Key**  and tap **Add account**.
2. Select **MS Exchange** or **Yahoo!, Windows Live, Hotmail, AOL (or other)**.
3. Enter your email address, password, and any other relevant information and tap **Next**.
4. Enter a name for the account, confirm how you want your name to appear in outgoing mail, then tap **Done**.

To change account settings:

1. Open the **Accounts** screen.
2. Tap the account which you want to change the settings of.
3. Tap the **Menu Key** , then tap **More > Settings**.
4. Configure the settings as desired.

To delete an email account:

1. Open the **Accounts** screen.
2. Touch and hold the account you want to delete.
3. Touch **Remove account** in the menu that opens.
4. Touch **Remove** in the dialog box to confirm that you want to delete the account.

Camera

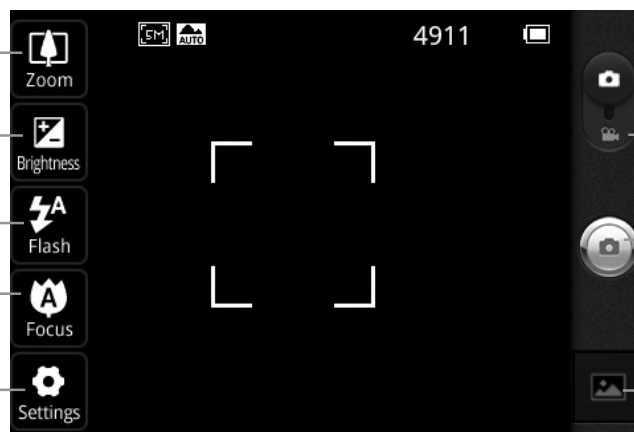
Getting to know the viewfinder

Focus - Allows you to change the focus settings, which allow the camera to focus on specific spots. See Using the focus mode.

Flash - Allows you to turn on the flash when taking a photo in a dark place.

Brightness - Allows you to adjust the brightness level.

Zoom - Zoom in or zoom out.



Video mode - Slide this icon down to switch to video mode.

Capture - Takes a photo.

Gallery - Touch to view the last photo you captured. This enables you to access your Gallery and view saved photos from within camera mode.

Settings - Touch this icon to open the settings menu. See Using the advanced settings.

Using the focus mode

You can select the focus mode from the following options:

Auto – Set the camera to focus automatically.

Macro – Macro mode allows you to take extreme close-ups. If you are trying to take a close-up shot but the focus box remains red, try turning Macro mode on.

Face tracking – Detects faces and tags them automatically.

Manual – Allows you to manually set the spot to focus.

Taking a quick photo

1. Open the **Camera** application.
2. Holding the phone horizontally, point the lens towards the subject you want to photograph.
3. Touch and hold the **Capture** icon .
4. The camera brings the image into focus. When the image is in focus, the focus indicators in each corner turn green. Lift your finger from the **Capture** icon  to take the picture.

Notice: A shading issue where the center and sides of the image have a color difference may occur when you try to take a picture indoors due to the characteristics of the camera.

Using the advanced settings

In the viewfinder, touch  to open all advanced options.

Image size – Touch to set the size (in pixels) of the picture you are taking. Select a pixel value from the following options: 5M (2592X1944), 3M (2048X1536), 2M (1600X1200), 1M (1280X960), VGA (640X480), QVGA (320X240).

Scene mode – Finds the color and light settings appropriate for the current environment. Choose from Auto, Portrait, Landscape, Sports, Sunset and Night.

ISO – Controls the camera's sensitivity to light. Choose from Auto, 400, 200, and 100.

White balance – Improves color qualities under different lighting conditions. Choose from Auto, Incandescent, Sunny, Fluorescent, and Cloudy.

Color effect – Choose a color tone for your new photo from None, Mono, Negative, Sepia, Posterize, Whiteboard, Blackboard, and Aqua.

Timer – Takes pictures a few seconds after clicking the shutter. This option is ideal if you want to be in the picture. Choose from Off, 3 secs., 5 secs., and 10 secs.

Shot mode – Select the desired shot mode. Choose from Normal, Continuous shot, Shallow focus shot, Smile shot, Beauty shot, Art shot, Panorama, Face effect, and Cartoon.

Image quality – Choose from Super fine, Fine, and Normal. The finer the quality, the sharper the photo. However, the file size will increase as a result, which means you'll be able to store fewer photos in the memory.

Auto review – Allows you to review images after taking pictures.

Shutter sound – Sets the sound played when taking a picture. Choose from Tone 1 ~ 4, and Off.

Tag location – Add geographical identification information to the picture.

TIP! The settings menu is superimposed over the viewfinder, so when you change **Color effect**, you will see a preview of the image change behind the settings menu.

Viewing your saved photos

1 You can access your saved photos from within the camera mode. Just touch  and your Gallery will appear on the screen. Touch the screen to view additional options for the image.



Touch to see a slideshow of your pictures.



Touch **Menu** and select the options you want. You can **Share** the contents or **Delete** a photo. Touch **More** for the options below.

Details – Check picture information.

Set as – Set as contact icon or wallpaper.

Crop – Crop your photo. Move your finger across the screen to select the area.

Rotate left – Rotates the image to the left.

Rotate right – Rotates the image to the right.

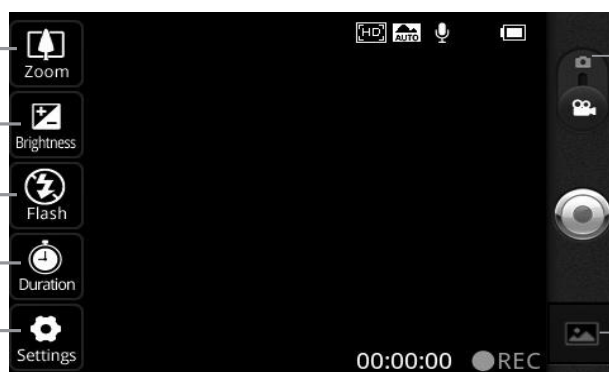
Video camera

Getting to know the viewfinder

Flash - Allows you to turn on the flash when taking a video in a dark place.

Brightness - Allows you to adjust the brightness level.

Zoom - Zoom in or zoom out.



Camera mode

- Slide this icon up to switch to camera mode.

Record

- Starts recording.

Gallery

- Touch to view the last video you recorded. This enables you to access your Gallery and view your saved videos from within video mode.

Settings - Touch this icon to open the settings menu. See Using the advanced settings.

Duration - Allows you to set the duration. Choose from Normal or MMS.

Recording a quick video

1. Open the **Camera** application and slide the camera mode button down to the **Video** position. The **Capture** icon  will change to .
2. The video camera viewfinder will appear on the screen.
3. Holding the phone horizontally, point the lens towards the subject of the video.
4. Touch the **Record** icon .
5. The duration of the recording will appear at the bottom right corner of the viewfinder.
6. Touch the **Stop** icon  to stop recording.

Using the advanced settings

Using the viewfinder, touch  to open all the advanced options.

Video size – Touch to set the size (in pixels) of the video you are recording. Select a pixel value from the following options: HD (1280x720), VGA (640x480), QVGA (320x240), and QCIF (176x144).

Scene mode – Finds the color and light settings appropriate for the current environment. Choose from Auto, Portrait, Landscape, Sports, Sunset, and Night.

White balance – The white balance ensures any white areas in your video are realistic. To enable your camera to adjust the white balance correctly, you may need to determine the light conditions. Choose from Auto, Incandescent, Sunny, Fluorescent, and Cloudy.

Color effect – Choose a color tone to use for your new video from None, Mono, Negative, Sepia, Posterize, Whiteboard, Blackboard, and Aqua.

Video quality – Choose from Super fine, Fine, and Normal. The finer the quality, the sharper the photo. However, the file size will increase as a result, which means you'll be able to store fewer photos in the memory.

Audio recording – Allows you to set if you want to record audio with the video.

Auto review – Allows you to review the video after recording it.

Watching your saved videos

1. In the viewfinder, touch .
2. Your Gallery will appear on the screen.
3. Touch a video once to start to playing it automatically.

Adjusting the volume when viewing a video

To adjust the volume of a video while it is playing, use the **Volume Keys**   on the right side of the phone.

Multimedia

Gallery

You can store any multimedia files on your phone's memory in your **Gallery** so that you have easy access to all of your pictures and videos. You can also save your files to your memory card. The advantage of using a memory card is that you can free up space on your phone memory.

Tap the **Applications tab**  and select **Gallery**.

To change how the contents of an album are displayed

You can view the images and videos in your albums in a chronological grid or in stacks, sorted by the date. Use the Album View switch  at the top right of the screen to switch between grid and stack view.

  Drag the Album View switch to the left to view the album contents in a chronological grid.

  Drag the Album View switch to the right to view the contents of the album in stacks.

Using SmartShare

SmartShare provides you with a better way to enjoy multimedia contents with other DLNA (Digital Living Network Alliance) enabled devices.

* **Share your media contents with other DLNA devices (DMS)**

1. In the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  and select **SmartShare**.
2. Read the SmartShare Tips and tap **Continue**.
3. Tap the **Menu Key**  and select **Settings**.
Then tap the **Discoverable** checkbox to make your contents discoverable by other devices.
4. In the Sharing contents section, tap the option for the file type you wish to share. A checkmark indicates that those types of files will be shared with other devices.

* **Let your renderer device (e.g. TV) play multimedia contents from remote content library (e.g. PC)**

1. Touch the **Applications tab**  and then **SmartShare**.
2. Tap  and select the device from the renderer device list.
3. Tap  and select a device to browse for media.

4. Browse the remote library for the desired content.
5. Tap the content with your finger to view it or tap the play button.

Notice: Check that your device is connected with your home network using a Wi-Fi connection to use this application.

Notice: Some DLNA enabled devices (e.g., TV) support only the Digital Media Player (DMP) feature of DLNA. The device (e.g., TV) will not appear in the renderer device list if it only supports the DMP feature.

Music

Your phone has a music player that lets you play all your favorite tracks. To access the music player, tap the **Applications tab**  and then **Music**.

Playing a song

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  and select **Music**.
2. Tap **Songs**.
3. Tap the song you want to play.
4. Tap  to pause the song.
5. Tap  to skip to the next song.

6. Tap  to go back to the first part of the song. Tap  twice to go back to the previous song.

To change the volume while listening to music, press the Up/Down **Volume Keys**   on the right side of the phone.

Touch and hold any song in the list, then choose from the following options: **Play, Add to playlist, Use as ringtone, Delete, Share, Search,** and **File info.**

NOTE: Music file copyrights may be protected by international contracts and national copyright laws. Therefore, it may be necessary to obtain permission or a licence to reproduce or copy music. In some countries, national laws prohibit private copying of copyrighted material. Before downloading or copying the file, please check the national laws of the relevant country concerning the use of such material.

Transferring files using USB mass storage devices

To transfer files using USB devices:

1. Connect the phone to a PC using a USB cable.
2. If you have not installed the LG Android Platform Driver on your PC, you will need to change the settings manually. From the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  > **Settings** > **Storage** > **Mass storage only**. A checkmark indicates the function is activated.
3. Touch **Turn on USB storage** > **OK**.
4. You can view the contents on your PC and transfer files to and from the PC.

NOTE:

- If you installed the LG Android Platform Driver, you will see the '**Turn on USB storage**' screen immediately.
- If you want to synchronize your phone with your PC using the LG PC Suite after using the USB mass storage function, from the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  > **Settings** > **Storage**, then touch **Mass storage only** to remove the checkmark and turn the function off.

How to save music/video files to your phone

1. Connect your phone to the PC using the USB cable.
 - Touch **Turn on USB storage** > **OK**. On the PC, select **Open folder to view files**.
 - If you have not installed the LG Android Platform Driver on your PC, you will need to set it manually. For more information, refer to 'Transferring files using USB mass storage devices on the previous page.
2. Save music or video files from your PC to the phone's removable storage.
 - You may copy or move files from your PC to the phone's removable storage using a card reader.
 - If there is a video file with a subtitle file (.smi or .srt file with the same name as the video file), place them in the same folder to display the subtitle automatically when playing the video file.
 - When downloading music or video files, copyright must be secured. Please note that a corrupted file or file with a wrong extension may cause damage to your phone.

How to send data from your phone via Bluetooth

You can send data via Bluetooth by running a corresponding application, rather than from the Bluetooth menu as with normal mobile phones.

- **Sending pictures:** Open the **Gallery** application and select a picture. Then tap **Menu > Share > Bluetooth**. If Bluetooth is off, tap **Bluetooth** to turn it on. A checkmark indicates the function is active. Then tap **Scan for devices** and choose the device you want to send data from the list.
- **Exporting contacts:** Open the **Contacts** application. Tap the contact you want to share. Tap the **Menu Key**  **> Share > Bluetooth**. If Bluetooth is off, tap **Bluetooth** to turn it on. A checkmark indicates the function is active. Then tap **Scan for devices** and choose the device you want to send data from the list.
- **Connecting to FTP (Only the FTP server is supported on this handset):** Tap the **Applications tab**  **> Settings > Wireless & networks > Bluetooth settings**. Then select the **Discoverable** check box and search for other devices. Find the service you want and connect to the FTP server.

TIP! The version of Bluetooth used by this device is Bluetooth 2.1 EDR and certified by Bluetooth SIG. It is compatible with other Bluetooth SIG certified devices.

NOTE: If you want to search for this phone from other devices, tap the **Applications tab**  > **Settings** > **Wireless & networks** > **Bluetooth settings**. Then select the **Discoverable** check box. Your device will now be detectable for 120 seconds.

NOTE: The supported Bluetooth profiles are HFP, HSP, OPP, PBAP (server), FTP (server), A2DP, and AVRCP.

Google applications

In order to take advantage of Google applications, you must first set up a Google account. You have the option to create a new account or sign in to an existing account.

After signing in to your account, your contacts, email and calendar in your Google account will automatically synchronize with your phone.

Google Maps™

Check your current location and traffic and receive directions to your destination. Your phone must be connected to Wi-Fi or 3G/GPRS.

NOTE: Google Maps does not cover all cities and countries.

When the Google Maps application is open, **tap** the **Menu Key**  for the following options: **Search, Directions, My Places, Clear Map, Join Latitude**, and **More** (Labs, Cache Settings, Help, Terms, Privacy & Notices, and About).

Market™

Android Market lets you download useful applications and games. If you install applications and games from Android Market, they appear in the phone's applications menu. You can check downloaded applications by tapping the **Menu Key**  > **My Apps**.

Gmail™

Gmail can be configured when you first set up your phone. Depending on your synchronization settings, Gmail is automatically synchronized on your phone with your Google account on the web. The inbox conversations list is your default Gmail view.

Tap the **Menu Key**  > **Refresh** to send or receive new emails and to synchronize your emails with your Google account on the web.

Tap the **Menu Key**  for options to compose an email, add accounts, go to labels, search, etc.

Google Talk™

Google Talk is Google's instant messaging program. It lets you communicate with other people who also use Google Talk.

Tap the **Menu Key**  and choose from the following options: **All friends**, **Add friend**, **Search**, **Sign out**, **Settings**, and **More** (Close all chats, Invites, and Blocked).

Google Search™

Tap the **Menu Key**  and tap **Search settings** to configure Google search, including setting which data on your phone you want to be able to search.

< Web >

Tap **Google search** to adjust the following Google search settings.

Show web suggestions – Tap to display suggestions for Google web searches below the Google search box as you type.

Use My Location – Tap to include your location when using Google search and other Google services. When you choose this option, you are asked whether you consent to allowing Google to use your location when providing these services.

Search history – Tap to use suggestions from web-based Google search history from your Google account.

Manage search history – Opens the browser with a web-based interface for viewing and managing the web search history associated with your Google account.

< Phone >

Searchable items – Opens a screen where you can types the types of data you are able to search for on your phone.

Clear shortcuts – Erases the list of previously chosen search results that appear as suggestions below the Google search box.

YouTube™

The YouTube application allows you to watch or upload videos.

NOTE: You can access YouTube with your Google account but you need a YouTube account for some services, such as video uploading.

Wi-Fi

Your phone can connect to the Internet using Wi-Fi.

Turn on Wi-Fi

1. Touch the **Status Bar** and drag it downwards to open the Notifications Panel.
2. Tap the **Wi-Fi** icon .

Connect to Wi-Fi networks

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Wireless & networks**.
4. Tap **Wi-Fi settings**.
5. Tap the **Wi-Fi** check box to select it and turn on Wi-Fi. Your phone scans for available networks.
6. Tap the network you want to use.
7. If necessary, enter the network password.
8. Tap **Connect**.

Wi-Fi Calling

Wi-Fi Calling can improve your coverage and allows you to make phone calls and send messages over a Wi-Fi network (when a Wi-Fi network is available). Unless your rate plan provides otherwise, Wi-Fi Calling minutes count the same as T-Mobile cellular calling minutes on your phone bill.

- To use Wi-Fi Calling, you must first turn on Wi-Fi and connect to a Wi-Fi network, then turn on Wi-Fi Calling.
- When the Wi-Fi Calling feature is turned on, your phone displays the **Wi-Fi Calling** icon  on the **Status Bar**.
- To stay on a Wi-Fi call, you must remain within range of the Wi-Fi network you are using. As you leave the Wi-Fi signal area, your phone will beep and display a warning message alerting you that your call will drop if you leave the signal area.

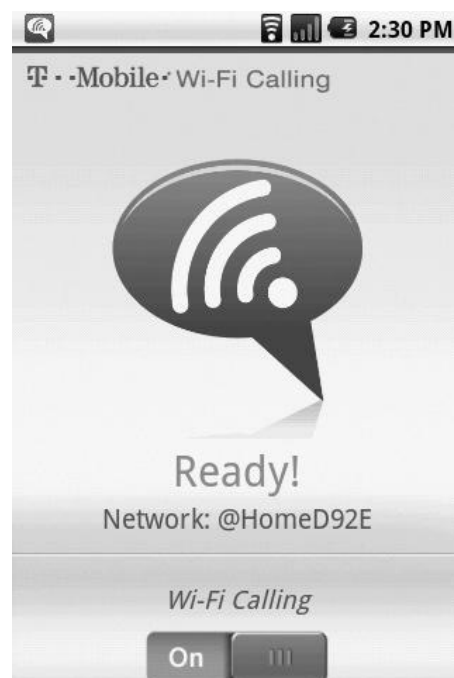
Wi-Fi Calling offers three connection options:

- **Wi-Fi Preferred:** All calls are made over an available Wi-Fi network. If a Wi-Fi network is not available, then calls are made over the cellular network.

- **Cellular Preferred:** All calls are made over the cellular network. If the cellular network is not available, then calls are made over an available Wi-Fi network.
- **Wi-Fi Only:** All calls are made over an available Wi-Fi network. If there are no available Wi-Fi networks, calls will not connect.

Turn on Wi-Fi Calling

1. Turn on Wi-Fi and connect to a Wi-Fi network.
2. From the Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
3. Tap **Wi-Fi Calling**.
4. If necessary, tap **Register**.
5. Tap the **On/Off** icon.



When you see the **Wi-Fi Calling** icon  on the **Status Bar**, you are ready to make phone calls and send messages over the Wi-Fi network.

Set connection preferences

Note: Wi-Fi Calling must be turned on before you can access the connection preferences settings.

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Scroll to and tap **Wi-Fi Calling**.
3. If necessary, tap the **On/Off** icon to turn Wi-Fi calling on.
4. Tap the **Menu Key** .
5. Tap **Settings**.
6. Tap **Connection preferences**.
7. Tap one of the following options:
 - **Wi-Fi Preferred**
 - **Cellular Preferred**
 - **Wi-Fi Only**
8. Tap **OK**.

Wi-Fi Sharing

Turn your phone into a Wi-Fi sharing and share your mobile data connection with up to five devices.

When you are accessing Wi-Fi Sharing, you cannot use the Wi-Fi connection to access the Internet on your phone.

To use your phone's Wi-Fi Sharing capability, you must have a Tethering and Wi-Fi Sharing service plan.

Turn on Wi-Fi Sharing

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Wireless & networks**.
4. Tap **Tethering & Wi-Fi sharing**.
5. Tap the **Wi-Fi sharing** check box to select it and enable the feature.
6. Tap **OK**.

Your phone starts broadcasting its Wi-Fi network name (SSID).

Locate your default SSID

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Wireless & networks**.

4. Tap **Tethering & Wi-Fi sharing**.
5. Tap the **Wi-Fi sharing** check box to select it and enable the feature.
6. Tap **Wi-Fi sharing settings**.
7. Tap **Configure Wi-Fi sharing**.
8. Your phone's SSID is located in the **Network SSID** field.

Configure Wi-Fi Sharing

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Wireless & networks**.
4. Tap **Tethering & Wi-Fi sharing**.
5. If necessary, tap the **Wi-Fi sharing** check box to select it and enable the feature.
6. Tap **Wi-Fi sharing settings**.
7. Tap **Configure Wi-Fi sharing**.
8. If desired, enter a unique device name for your Network SSID.
9. Tap the **Security** drop-down menu.
10. Tap the desired security setting.
11. If necessary, enter a password.
12. Tap **Save**.

Tethering

Use a USB cable to share your phone's mobile data connection with a single computer.

- Tethering works with Windows® 7, Windows XP, Windows Vista®, and Mac OS X. For more information on tethering with operating systems, go to www.android.com/tether.
- For Windows XP, you must install the tethering driver on your computer before you can tether. To install the driver, go to www.android.com/tether.
- When you use a USB cable to connect your phone to a computer, you can either share your mobile data connection by tethering or you can share files—you cannot do both. Do not turn on tethering if you want to use your computer to access your phone's memory card.

Tether your phone

Bluetooth®

Your phone comes with Bluetooth connectivity, a wireless technology that enables a data connection between your phone and a Bluetooth headset or other Bluetooth device (sold separately).

Prepare Bluetooth headset

Make sure your headset is fully charged and in pairing mode. Refer to the headset's user manual for more information.

Turn on Bluetooth and pair with headset

1. From any Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Wireless & networks**.
4. Tap the **Bluetooth** check box to select it and turn on Bluetooth.
5. Tap **Bluetooth settings**.
6. Tap **Scan for devices**. Your phone scans for and displays a list of available Bluetooth devices.
7. From the list, tap the headset you want to pair with your phone.
8. If necessary, enter a PIN, passcode, or confirm matching passcodes.
9. Tap **OK**.

DriveSmart®

DriveSmart helps minimize driving distractions by managing incoming notifications.

When DriveSmart is turned on, incoming text message notifications are silenced and all incoming voice calls are sent directly to voicemail or a Bluetooth® headset.

Turn on DriveSmart

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Tap **DriveSmart**.
3. Tap the **DriveSmart** check box to select it and enable the feature.

Turn on Bluetooth® routing

DriveSmart can route all incoming calls to a Bluetooth device.

To route calls to a Bluetooth device:

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **DriveSmart**.
4. Tap the **Enable Bluetooth** check box to select it and enable the feature.

Turn on and customize auto response

DriveSmart can be set up to send an auto response text message to all incoming calls and texts.

To turn on auto response:

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **DriveSmart**.
4. Tap the **Enable Auto Response** check box to select it and enable the feature.

To customize auto response:

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **DriveSmart**.
4. Tap **Edit Auto Response**.
5. Enter the desired auto response text.
6. Tap **OK**.

Battery management

There are some things that you can do to optimize your phone's battery life.

Turn off Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, and GPS

1. Touch and drag the **Status Bar** down to open the Notifications Panel.
2. Tap the **Wi-Fi** , **Bluetooth** , and **GPS**  icons to turn off. When turned off, the icons are grey.

Adjust backlight duration

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Display**.
4. Adjust any of the following options:
 - **Brightness:** Touch and drag the slider to the left to reduce screen brightness. Tap **OK**.
 - **Screen timeout:** Tap the desired timeout duration.

Lower screen brightness

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Display**.

4. Tap **Brightness**.
5. Touch and drag the slider to the left to lower screen brightness.
6. Tap **OK**.

Change account synchronization interval

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Tap **Email**.
3. Tap the email account you want to change.
Note: If you have multiple email accounts set up, to see your combined Inbox, tap the **Menu Key**  > **More** > **Accounts**.
4. Tap the **Menu Key** .
5. Tap **More**.
6. Tap **Settings**.
7. Tap **Retrieve interval**.
8. Tap the desired setting.
9. Tap the **Back Key**  to return to your Inbox.

Memory management

Use Application Manager

Use Application Manager to free up memory by stopping applications that are running but you are not currently using.

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Tap **Application Manager**.
3. Tap **Stop** to the right of the application name to stop the application from running in the background.

Delete browser cache

Get more storage space by clearing out your browser caches.

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Tap **Browser**.
3. Tap the **Menu Key** .
4. Tap **More**.
5. Tap **Settings**.
6. Tap **Clear cache, Clear history, Clear all cookie data, and Clear form data**.
7. Tap **OK**.

Adjust email settings

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Applications** tab .
2. Tap **Email**.
3. Tap the email account you want to adjust.
Note: If you have multiple email accounts set up, to see your combined Inbox, tap the **Menu Key**  > **More** > **Accounts**.
4. Tap the **Menu Key** .
5. Tap **More**.
6. Tap **Settings**.
7. Tap **Retrieve interval** and **Maximum mails to show**.
8. Tap the desired setting.
9. Tap the **Back Key**  to return to the email Inbox.

Uninstall applications

1. From the Home screen, tap the **Menu Key** .
2. Tap **Settings**.
3. Tap **Applications**.
4. Tap **Manage applications**.
5. Tap the **All** tab.
6. Tap the application you want to uninstall.
7. Tap **Uninstall**.
8. Tap **OK**.

Utilities

Setting your alarm

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  and select **Alarm/Clock**.
2. If you want to add a new alarm, tap **New alarm**.
3. Set the **Time**, **Repeat**, and **Ringtone** options for the alarm. You can also tap the **Vibration** check box  to set the alarm to vibrate along with the ringtone and **Memo** to add a name to the alarm.
4. Tap **Save** to save the alarm.

NOTE: To change the alarm settings on the alarm list screen, tap the **Menu Key**  and select **Settings**. You can choose from the following options: **Alarm in silent mode**, **Alarm volume**, and **Side button behavior**, **Weather options**, and **Puzzle lock options**.

Using your calculator

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  and select **Calculator**.
2. Tap the number keys to enter numbers.
3. For simple calculations, touch the function you want (+, −, x, or ÷), followed by =.
4. For more complex calculations, tap the **Menu Key**  and select **Advanced panel**.

Adding an event to your calendar

1. On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  and select **Calendar**.

NOTE: You must first create a Google account to use **Calendar**.

2. To view an event, tap the date. To add a new event, tap the **Menu Key**  and then tap **New event**.
3. Tap the **Event name** field and enter the event name. Check the date and enter the time you want your event to begin and finish.
4. Tap the **Event location** field and enter the location.
5. If you would like to add a note to your event, tap the **Description** field and enter the details.
6. If you want to repeat the alarm, set **Repetition**. You can also set **Reminders**, if necessary.
7. Tap **Save** to save the event in the calendar. A colored square in the calendar will mark all days that have saved events. An alarm will sound at the event start time to help you stay organized.

The Web

Browser

The Browser gives you a fast, full-color world of games, music, news, sports, entertainment and much more, right on your mobile phone; wherever you are and whatever you're into.

NOTE: Additional charges apply when connecting to these services and downloading content. Check data charges with your network provider.

Using options

Tap the **Menu Key**  to view the following options:



New window: Opens a new window.



Windows: Displays all your open windows.



Forward: Go forward to the page you connected to after the current page. The **Back Key**  takes you to the previous page.



Bookmarks: Displays your bookmarks, most visited site, and history.



Add bookmark: Add the current web page as a bookmark.



More

- **Read it later:** Allows you to save web pages so you can read them later.
- **Add RSS Feed:** Allows you to save RSS feeds to constantly stay up-to-date with your favorite web sites.
- **Share page:** Allows you to share the web page with others.
- **Find on page:** Allows you to find letters or words on the current web page.
- **Select text:** Allows you to copy any text from the web page.
- **Home page:** Directs you to your home page.
- **Set home page:** Allows you to set the current page as your home page.
- **Add shortcut to Home:** Adds a shortcut to the current URL to your Home screen.
- **Page info:** Displays the web page information.
- **Downloads:** Displays your download history.
- **Settings:** Allows you to change the web browser settings.

NOTE: To return the previous page, touch the **Back Key**

Settings

On the Home screen, tap the **Applications tab**  and tap **Settings**.

Wireless & networks

This menu allows you to manage Wi-Fi and Bluetooth. You can also set Mobile networks and Airplane mode.

Airplane mode – All wireless connections will be disabled if Airplane mode is enabled.

Wi-Fi – Tap to turn on Wi-Fi to connect to any available Wi-Fi networks.

Wi-Fi settings – Allows you to set up and manage wireless access points. Set a Network notification or add a Wi-Fi network. The advanced Wi-Fi settings screen is accessed from the Wi-Fi settings screen. Tap the **Menu Key**  and tap **Advanced**.

TIP! How to obtain the MAC address

To set up a connection in some wireless networks with MAC filters, you may need to enter the MAC address of your phone into the router.

You can find the MAC address by tapping the **Applications tab**  > **Settings** > **Wireless & networks** > **Wi-Fi settings**. Then tap the **Menu Key**  > **Advanced** > **MAC address**.

Wi-Fi Direct settings – Allows you to configure a connection directly with Wi-Fi devices without any Access Point.

Bluetooth – Tap to turn on Bluetooth to connect to Bluetooth devices.

Bluetooth settings – Set the device name, Discoverable mode, and scan for other devices. You can also check a list of Bluetooth devices that you've previously configured and those detected when the phone last scanned for Bluetooth devices.

Tethering & Wi-Fi sharing – You can configure the settings for USB tethering and Wi-Fi sharing.

VPN settings – Displays the list of Virtual Private Networks (VPNs) that you've previously configured. Allows you to add different types of VPNs.

Mobile networks – Set options for Data roaming, network mode and operators, and Access Point Names (APNs).

Call settings

Use this menu to configure phone call settings.

Fixed Dialing Numbers – Allows you to manage your Fixed Dialing Numbers (FDN).

< Voicemail >

Voicemail service – Allows you to select your carrier's voicemail service or another service, such as Google Voice™.

Voicemail settings – If you are using your carrier's voicemail service, this option allows you to enter the phone number to use for listening to your voicemail. You can enter a comma (,) to insert a pause into the number. For example, to add a password after the phone number. If you are using Google Voice, this opens a screen where you can view the Google Voice number or sign out of Google Voice.

< Other call settings >

TTY mode – Allows you to set TTY mode to communicate with other TTY devices.

Hearing aids – Allows you to turn on hearing aid compatibility.

Voice clarity – Select this option to make voice sound clearer under noisy environments.

Call reject – Allows you to enable and disable the Call reject function and manage your Call reject list.

Decline call with a message – Allows you to add and edit the decline messages.

Call forwarding – Allows you to enable and disable call forwarding and enter the phone number you wish to forward calls to.

Call duration – View the duration of all calls including all calls, dialed calls, received calls, and the last call.

Additional settings – Allows you to configure Caller ID and Call Waiting.

DriveSmart

DriveSmart helps minimize driving distractions by managing incoming notifications.

Upgrade To DriveSmart Plus – Download DriveSmart Plus for Automatic Driving Detection and more.

DriveSmart – Allows you to enable and disable DriveSmart.

Enable Bluetooth – Allows you to enable and disable Bluetooth routing so that calls are sent to your Bluetooth headset while you are driving.

Enable Auto Response – Allows you to enable or disable Auto response so that an SMS is automatically sent to the caller while you are driving.

Edit Auto Response – Allows you to edit the Auto Response message.

Sound

This menu allows you to configure your phone's sound settings.

< General >

Silent mode – Allows you to silence all sounds (including call and notification ringtones) except the audio from music, videos, and any alarms you have set (You must silence media and alarms in their own applications).

Vibrate – Allows you to set your phone to vibrate when you receive an incoming call.

Volume – Allows you to set the volume for ringtones, media and alarms. If you uncheck the option to use the same volume for both calls and notifications, you can set both volumes separately.

< Incoming calls >

Phone ringtone – Allows you to set your default incoming call ringtone.

< Notifications >

Notification ringtone – Allows you to set your default notification ringtone.

< Feedback >

Audible touch tones – Allows you to set the phone to play tones when using the keypad to dial numbers.

Audible selection – Allows you to set your phone to play a sound when you touch buttons, icons, and other on-screen items that react to your touch.

Screen lock sounds – Allows you to set your phone to play a sound when locking and unlocking the screen.

Haptic feedback – Allows you to set your phone to vibrate briefly when you touch the **Menu Key**

, **Home Key** , **Back Key** , **Search Key** , and perform other actions.

Display

This menu allows you to configure your phone's display settings.

Brightness – Allows you to adjust the brightness of the screen.

Auto-rotate screen – Allows you to set the orientation to automatically switch to landscape mode or portrait mode when you turn the phone sideways or upright.

Animation – Allows you to set animated transitions when navigating from screen to screen.

Screen timeout – Allows you to adjust the delay time before the screen automatically turns off. For the best battery performance, use the shortest convenient timeout.

Display font – Allows you to change the font displayed on your screen.

Wallpaper – Allows you to change your wallpaper.

Small screen display

This menu allows you to change the shortcuts on the Small screen and learn how to use it.

Small screen shortcuts – Allows you to select the shortcuts on the small screen.

Small screen tutorial – Displays the Small screen tutorial so that you can learn how to use it.

Location & security

This menu allows you to configure your phone's location and security settings.

< My Location >

Use wireless networks – If you select Use wireless networks, your phone will determine your approximate location by using Wi-Fi and mobile networks.

Use GPS satellites – If you select Use GPS satellites, your phone will be determine your location to street-level accuracy.

< Screen unlock >

Set up screen lock – Allows you to set an unlock pattern to secure your phone. Choosing **Pattern** opens a set of screens that guide you through drawing a screen unlock pattern. You can also set a **PIN** or **Password** instead of Pattern or leave it as **None**.

TIP! To lock your screen by using the Pattern Lock

1. The first time you do this, a short tutorial about creating an unlock pattern appears.
2. You are prompted to draw and redraw your pattern. The next time you turn on your phone or wake up the screen, you will be prompted to draw your unlock pattern to unlock the screen.

< SIM/RUIM card lock >

Set up SIM/RUIM card lock – Set up SIM/RUIM card lock or change the SIM/RUIM PIN.

< Passwords >

Visible passwords – Select to show passwords as you type them or deselect to hide passwords as you type them.

< Device administration >

Select device administrators – Add or remove device administrators.

< Credential storage >

Use secure credentials – Select to allow applications to access your phone's encrypted store of secure certificates, related passwords and other credentials. You use credential storage to establish some kinds of VPN and Wi-Fi

connections. If you have not set a password for credential storage, this setting is dimmed.

Install from SD card – Allows you to install encrypted certificates from a microSD card.

Set password – Allows you to set or change the password for your secure credential storage. Your password must have at least eight characters.

Clear storage – Deletes all secure certificates and related credentials and erases the secure storage password.

Applications

This menu allows you to manage your phone's application settings.

Unknown sources – Permits installation of applications that you obtain from websites, email or other locations other than Android Market.

 **WARNING:** To protect your phone and personal data, only download applications from trusted sources, such as Android Market.

Quick launch – Allows you to set the keyboard shortcuts to launch applications.

Manage applications – Manage and remove installed applications.

Running services – Allows you to view and control currently running services and applications. This option displays what processes each running service needs and how much memory it is using.

Storage use – View storage used by applications.

Battery use – View what features have been using the battery.

Development – Allows you to set options for application development, such as **USB debugging**, **Stay awake**, and **Allow mock locations**.

Accounts & sync

This menu allows you to manage your account and synchronization settings.

< General sync settings >

Background data – Permits applications to synchronize data in the background, whether or not you are actively working in them. Unchecking this setting can save battery power and lowers (but does not eliminate) data use.

Auto-sync – Permits applications to synchronize, send, and receive data on their own schedule.

< Social+ Update Settings >

Allows you to manage your social network accounts for the Social+ application.

< Manage accounts >

Displays a list of all Google accounts and other accounts you've added to your phone.

If you touch an account in this screen, the account screen opens.

Privacy

This menu allows you to choose if you wish to restore your phone to its original factory settings.

< Personal data >

Factory data reset – If you select Factory data reset, it will erase all of your personal data from system memory, including information about your Google account, any other accounts, your system/application data and settings as well as any downloaded applications and DRM license.

Resetting the phone does not erase any system software updates you have downloaded or any files on your microSD card, such as music or photos. If you reset the phone in this way, you are prompted to reenter the same information as when you first started Android.

Storage

This menu allows you to configure the USB connection mode and view your memory storage space.

< USB connection mode >

Mass storage only – Your phone can be used as a mass storage device if you have a memory card inserted. You can set **Mass storage only** as a default setting for USB connection mode.

< SD card >

Allows you to check the total space and available space on your microSD card. Touch **Unmount SD card** to safely remove the microSD card. If you want to delete all data from the microSD card and erase a microSD card, the microSD card must be unmounted first.

< System memory >

Displays the available space for system memory.

Language & keyboard

Use the **Language & keyboard** settings to select the language and region for the text on your phone and for configuring the on-screen keyboard, including words that you have added to the dictionary.

Voice input & output

< Voice input >

Voice recogniser settings – Use the **Voice recogniser settings** to configure the Android voice input feature.

- **Language** – Opens a screen where you can set the language you use when entering text by speaking.
- **SafeSearch** – Opens a dialog where you can set whether you want Google SafeSearch filter to block some results.
- **Block offensive words** – When unchecked, Google voice recognition will recognize and transcribe words many people consider offensive, when you enter text by speaking. When checked, Google voice recognition replaces those words in transcriptions with a place holder comprised of hash symbols (#).
- **Personalized recognition** – Improves speech recognition accuracy.
- **Google Account dashboard** – Allows you to manage your collected data.

< Voice output >

Text-to-speech settings – Use the **Text-to-speech settings** to configure the Android text-to-speech synthesizer for applications that can take advantage of it.

NOTE: If you don't have speech synthesizer data installed, only the **Install voice data** setting is available.

- **Listen to an example** – Plays a brief sample of the speech synthesizer, using your current settings.
- **Always use my settings** – Check to use the settings on this screen in place of speech synthesizer settings available in other applications.
- **Default Engine** – Opens a dialog where you can set the text-to-speech application you want to use, if you have more than one installed.
- **Install voice data** – If your phone does not have speech synthesizer data installed, this connects to Android Market and guides you through the process of downloading and installing the data. This setting is not available if the data is already installed.
- **Speech rate** – Opens a dialog where you can select how quickly you want the synthesizer to speak.

Consumer Information About Radio Frequency Emissions

Your wireless phone, which contains a radio transmitter and receiver, emits radio frequency energy during use. The following consumer information addresses commonly asked questions about the health effects of wireless phones.

Are wireless phones safe?

Scientific research on the subject of wireless phones and radio frequency ("RF") energy has been conducted worldwide for many years, and continues. In the United States, the Food and Drug Administration ("FDA") and the Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") set policies and procedures for wireless phones. The FDA issued a website publication on health issues related to cell phone usage where it states, "The scientific community at large ... believes that the weight of scientific evidence does not show an association between exposure to radiofrequency (RF) from cell phones and adverse health outcomes. Still the scientific community does recommend conducting additional research to address gaps in knowledge. That research

is being conducted around the world and FDA continues to monitor developments in this field. You can access the joint FDA/FCC website at <http://www.fda.gov> (under "C" in the subject index, select Cell Phones > Research). You can also contact the FDA toll-free at (888) 463-6332 or (888) INFO-FDA. In June 2000, the FDA entered into a cooperative research and development agreement through which additional scientific research is being conducted. The FCC issued its own website publication stating that "there is no scientific evidence that proves that wireless phone usage can lead to cancer or a variety of other problems, including headaches, dizziness or memory loss." This publication is available at <http://www.fcc.gov/oet/rfsafety> or through the FCC at (888) 225-5322 or (888) CALL-FCC.

What does "SAR" mean?

In 1996, the FCC, working with the FDA, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and other agencies, established RF exposure safety guidelines for wireless phones in the United States. Before a wireless phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested by the manufacturer and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed limits established by

the FCC. One of these limits is expressed as a Specific Absorption Rate, or "SAR." SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy in the body. Tests for SAR are conducted with the phone transmitting at its highest power level in all tested frequency bands. Since 1996, the FCC has required that the SAR of handheld wireless phones not exceed 1.6 watts per kilogram, averaged over one gram of tissue.

Although the SAR is determined at the highest power level, the actual SAR value of a wireless phone while operating can be less than the reported SAR value. This is because the SAR value may vary from call to call, depending on factors such as proximity to a cell site, the proximity of the phone to the body while in use, and the use of hands-free devices. Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government-adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 0.71 W/kg and when worn on the body, as described in this user guide, is 1.37 W/kg (body-worn measurements differ

among phone models, depending upon available accessories and FCC requirements).

While there may be differences between SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement for safe exposure.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF emission guidelines. SAR information on this model phone is on file with the FCC and can be found under the Display Grant section of <http://www.fcc.gov/oet/ea/fccid/> after searching on FCC ID BEJC729.

Can I minimize my RF exposure?

If you are concerned about RF, there are several simple steps you can take to minimize your RF exposure. You can, of course, reduce your talk time. You can place more distance between your

body and the source of the RF, as the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. The FDA/FCC website states that "hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are used against the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit." Also, if you use your wireless phone while in a car, you can use a phone with an antenna on the outside of the vehicle. You should also read and follow your wireless phone manufacturer's instructions for the safe operation of your phone.

Do wireless phones pose any special risks to children?

The FDA/FCC website states that "the scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless communication devices, including children." The FDA/FCC website further states

that "some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all". For example, the Stewart Report from the United Kingdom ["UK"] made such a recommendation in December 2000. In this report a group of independent experts noted that no evidence exists that using a cell phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. [The UK's] recommendation to limit cell phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists. TIA Safety Information

The following is the complete TIA Safety Information for wireless handheld phones.

Exposure to Radio Frequency Signal

Your wireless handheld portable phone is a low power radio transmitter and receiver. When ON, it receives and sends out Radio Frequency (RF) signals.

In August, 1996, the Federal Communications Commissions (FCC) adopted RF exposure guidelines with safety levels for handheld wireless phones. Those guidelines are consistent with the safety standards previously set by both U.S. and international standards bodies:

ANSI C95.1 (1992) *

NCRP Report 86 (1986)

ICNIRP (1996)

* American National Standards Institute;
National Council on Radiation Protection and
Measurements; International Commission on
Non-Ionizing Radiation Protection

Those standards were based on comprehensive and periodic evaluations of the relevant scientific literature. For example, over 120 scientists, engineers, and physicians from universities, government health agencies, and industry

reviewed the available body of research to develop the ANSI Standard (C95.1).

The design of your phone complies with the FCC guidelines (and those standards).

Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and may violate FCC regulations.

Phone Operation

NORMAL POSITION: Hold the phone as you would any other telephone with the antenna pointed up and over your shoulder.

Tips on Efficient Operation

For your phone to operate most efficiently:
Don't touch the antenna unnecessarily when the phone is in use. Contact with the antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than otherwise needed.

Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from RF signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone.

Pacemakers

The Health Industry Manufacturers Association recommends that a minimum separation of six (6) inches be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker.

These recommendations are consistent with the independent research by and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.

Persons with pacemakers:

- Should ALWAYS keep the phone more than six (6) inches from their pacemaker when the phone is turned ON;
- Should not carry the phone in a breast pocket;
- Should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference;
- Should turn the phone OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your service provider (or call the customer service line to discuss alternatives).

Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Health Care Facilities

Turn your phone OFF in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may use equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Posted Facilities

Turn your phone OFF in any facility where posted notices so require.

Aircraft

FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while in the air. Switch OFF your phone before boarding an aircraft.

Blasting Areas

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn your phone OFF when in a "blasting area" or in areas posted: "Turn off two-way radio". Obey all signs and instructions.

Potentially Explosive Atmosphere

Turn your phone OFF when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always marked clearly. Potential areas may include: fueling areas (such as gasoline stations); below deck on boats; fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities; vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane); areas where the air contains chemicals or particles (such as grain, dust, or metal powders); and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

For Vehicles Equipped with an Air Bag

An air bag inflates with great force. DO NOT place objects, including either installed or portable wireless equipment, in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If in-vehicle wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.

FDA Consumer Update



The U.S. Food and Drug Administration's Center for Devices and Radiological Health Consumer Update on Mobile Phones:

1. Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of Radio Frequency (RF) energy in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in idle mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

2. What is the FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, the FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit Radio Frequency (RF) energy at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, the FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace, or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data does not justify FDA regulatory actions, the FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;
- Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on

human health.

The FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency
- Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

The FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. The FCC relies on the FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

The FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures

that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

3. What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term "wireless phone" refers here to handheld wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called "cell", "mobile", or "PCS" phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable Radio Frequency (RF) energy because of the short distance between the phone and the user's head.

These RF exposures are limited by FCC safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of the FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures far below the FCC safety limits.

4. What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in the absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we do not know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health. Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer,

glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phone RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

5. What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but ten or more years follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop — if they do — may be many,

many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

6. What is the FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

The FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy.

The FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization International Electro Magnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

The FDA and the Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research And Development

Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. The FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts with independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

7. How can I find out how much Radio Frequency energy exposure I can get by using my wireless phone?

All phones sold in the United States must comply with Federal Communications Commission (FCC) guidelines that limit Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposures. The FCC established these guidelines in consultation with the FDA and the other federal health and safety agencies. The FCC limit for RF exposure from wireless phones is set at a Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC limit is consistent with the safety standards developed by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineering (IEEE) and the National Council on Radiation Protection

and Measurement. The exposure limit takes into consideration the body's ability to remove heat from the tissues that absorb energy from the wireless phone and is set well below levels known to have effects. Manufacturers of wireless phones must report the RF exposure level for each model of phone to the FCC. The FCC website (<http://www.fcc.gov/oet/rfsafety>) gives directions for locating the FCC identification number on your phone so you can find your phone's RF exposure level in the online listing.

8. What has the FDA done to measure the Radio Frequency energy coming from wireless phones?

The Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) is developing a technical standard for measuring the Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposure from wireless phones and other wireless handsets with the participation and leadership of FDA scientists and engineers. The standard, "Recommended Practice for Determining the Spatial-Peak Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) in the Human Body Due to Wireless Communications Devices: Experimental Techniques", sets forth the first consistent test methodology for measuring the rate at which RF is deposited in the heads of wireless phone users.

The test method uses a tissue-simulating model of the human head. Standardized SAR test methodology is expected to greatly improve the consistency of measurements made at different laboratories on the same phone. SAR is the measurement of the amount of energy absorbed in tissue, either by the whole body or a small part of the body. It is measured in watts/kg (or milliwatts/g) of matter. This measurement is used to determine whether a wireless phone complies with safety guidelines.

9. What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to Radio Frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products — and at this point we do not know that there is — it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy. Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure. If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically

with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna. Again, the scientific data does not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

10. What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy, the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless

phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

11. What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio Frequency (RF) energy from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, the FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure Electro Magnetic Interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical Instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by the FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI.

The FDA has tested hearing aids for interference from handheld wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and

performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a "compatible" phone and a "compatible" hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000. The FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur, the FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

- Give full attention to driving -- driving safely is your first responsibility;

- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions or the law require it.

FCC Hearing-Aid Compatibility (HAC) Regulations for Wireless Devices

While some wireless phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate.

The wireless telephone industry has developed a rating system for wireless phones, to assist hearing device users to find phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that are rated have the rating on their box or a label located on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees.

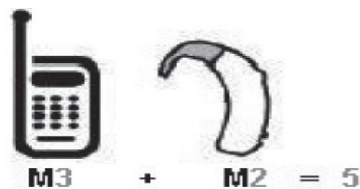
Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully.

Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

Hearing devices may also be rated. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find this rating. Higher ratings mean that the hearing device is relatively immune to interference noise. The hearing aid and wireless phone rating values are then added together. A sum of 5 is considered acceptable for normal use. A sum of 6 is considered for best use.



In the above example, if a hearing aid meets the M2 level rating and the wireless phone meets the M3 level rating, the sum of the two values equal M5. This should provide the hearing aid user with "normal usage" while using their hearing aid with the particular wireless phone. "Normal usage" in this context is defined as a signal quality that's acceptable for normal operation.

FCC Hearing-Aid Compatibility (HAC) Regulations for Wireless Devices

The M mark is intended to be synonymous with the U mark. The T mark is intended to be synonymous with the UT mark.

The M and T marks are recommended by the Alliance for Telecommunications Industries Solutions (ATIS). The U and UT marks are referenced in Section 20.19 of the FCC Rules. The HAC rating and measurement procedure are described in the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19 standard.

To enter that the Hearing Aid Compatibility rating for your phone is maintained, secondary transmitters such as Bluetooth and WLAN (this phone does not have WLAN) components must be disabled during a call. See page 118 for instructions to disable these components.

Limited Warranty Statement

1. WHAT THIS WARRANTY COVERS:

LG offers you a limited warranty that the enclosed subscriber unit and its enclosed accessories will be free from defects in material and workmanship, according to the following terms and conditions:

- (1) The limited warranty for the product extends for TWELVE (12) MONTHS beginning on the date of purchase of the product with valid proof of purchase, or absent valid proof of purchase, FIFTEEN (15) MONTHS from date of manufacture as determined by the unit's manufacture date code.

- (3) Breakage or damage to antennas unless caused directly by defects in material or workmanship.
- (4) That the Customer Service Department at LG was not notified by consumer of the alleged defect or malfunction of the product during the applicable limited warranty period.
- (5) Products which have had the serial number removed or made illegible.
- (6) This limited warranty is in lieu of all other warranties, express or implied either in fact or by operations of law, statutory or otherwise, including, but not limited to any implied warranty of marketability or fitness for a particular use.
- (7) Damage resulting from use of non LG approved accessories.
- (8) All plastic surfaces and all other externally exposed parts that are scratched or damaged due to normal customer use.

- (9) Products operated outside published maximum ratings.
- (10) Products used or obtained in a rental program.
- (11) Consumables (such as fuses).

3. WHAT LG WILL DO:

LG will, at its sole option, either repair, replace or refund the purchase price of any unit that is covered under this limited warranty.
